

## Update #9: Austroads Guide to Temporary Traffic Management

The Austroads Guide to Temporary Traffic Management (AGTTM) was first published by Austroads in December 2019, alongside the release of the updated Australian Standard (AS) 1742.3: *Manual of uniform traffic control devices*.

In January 2021, Tasmania formally adopted the AGTTM as the primary resource for guidance on temporary traffic management practices, including planning, design, and implementation.

Tasmania is one of several jurisdictions that have formally adopted the AGTTM since its release, including South Australia, Western Australia, and Queensland.

Austroads have actively engaged with the industry and invited feedback from users of the AGTTM.

Austroads have been assessing and reviewing feedback received from member agencies and industry since the initial December 2019 release.

### ***Austroads has released an updated Guide to Temporary Traffic Management Edition 1.1.***

Additionally, a full [report](#) has accompanied the release. This report presents the technical items that comprise the update of the AGTTM to edition 1.1.

This report will provide users of the AGTTM with information about which items have been updated, reviewed, or changed and the discussions and actions that took place regarding that issue.

The updates originate from issues and feedback received from numerous parties, including the Austroads member agencies and the industry.

It is noted that the updates identified in this revision are not expected to result in any major impact to the traffic management industry in Tasmania.

A [summary report](#) has also been developed to outline the updates included in edition 1.1.

Please note, Part 8 of the AGTTM: Processes and Procedures will not be included in the initial release of edition 1.1.

Part 8 of the AGTTM sets out the policies and procedures around road categorisation, training, approved training providers and temporary traffic management organisation prequalification's.

Part 8, edition 1.0 is still current.

The Tasmanian temporary traffic management industry must use the most recent version of the AGTTM in planning, designing, and implementing temporary traffic management. The Department of

State Growth will allow 6 months for the industry to familiarise themselves with the various updated aspects of the AGTTM.

By March 2022, all temporary traffic management in the State must comply with edition 1.1 of the AGTTM.

The Tasmanian Guide to Traffic Control for Works on Roads is under review to reflect future requirements when updates are made to the AGTTM.
